# Materials:

Old greeting cards Pinking shears or decorativeedge scissors Hole punch

White or clear glue Glitter

Yarn

# Directions:

1) Cut the front of the card into shapes of your choice using pinking shears or decorativeedge scissors. You could cut out rectangles, circles, triangles, hearts, and so on.
Punch a hole in the top of the tag.

2) Squeeze glue around the edges of the shapes and sprinkle glitter on top. Shake the excess glitter off the gift tag onto a piece of paper. Either fold the paper in half and pour the excess glitter back into the

container or discard.

3) Thread a six-inch piece of yarn through the hole and knot the ends.

If desired, you could use the front and back of the greeting card when cutting out your shapes and tie the two pieces together with the yarn forming a gift tag that opens up to include a




# 10 Little Ways To Show Your Kids You Love Them Every Day

Beat an egg, using a fork, in a medium, low bowl. Add about \(^{3}\) cup milk per each egg used. Add a teaspoon of maple syrup and stir well. Using a heart-shaped cookie cut-

ter, cut out heart shapes from the center of bread slices.

Dip all bread pieces into egg mixture and set onto pancake griddle or large skillet set on medium heat. Brown lightly on both sides.

# Directions

During the first 20-30 minutes, each group should construct a monthly budget for its family (the family profile should be given), using the budget cost sheets. Ask each group to reflect on the difficulty or ease of creating the budget.

During the next 30 minutes, ask each group to draw a "Life Happens" card from the basket. Small groups should then rearrange their budgets, making difficult decisions, as necessary. Ask each group to reflect on the difficulty or ease of creating the revised budget.


# An Effective Way To Help Your Child Master Math Skills With LEGO Blocks


