



Helping Child Hunger Through the Child Care Food Program (CCFP)

These household characteristics increase the risk for Food Insecurity :

- ♦ 19.9% of households with children under 6
- ♦ 35.3% of households with children headed by a single woman
- ♦ 33.7% of low-income households with incomes below 185% of the federal poverty level.


